It can drink without ever finding a puddle! Tiny grooves between its scales pull water uphill, all the way to its mouth. Scientists call it capillary action — I call it bonkers.

3

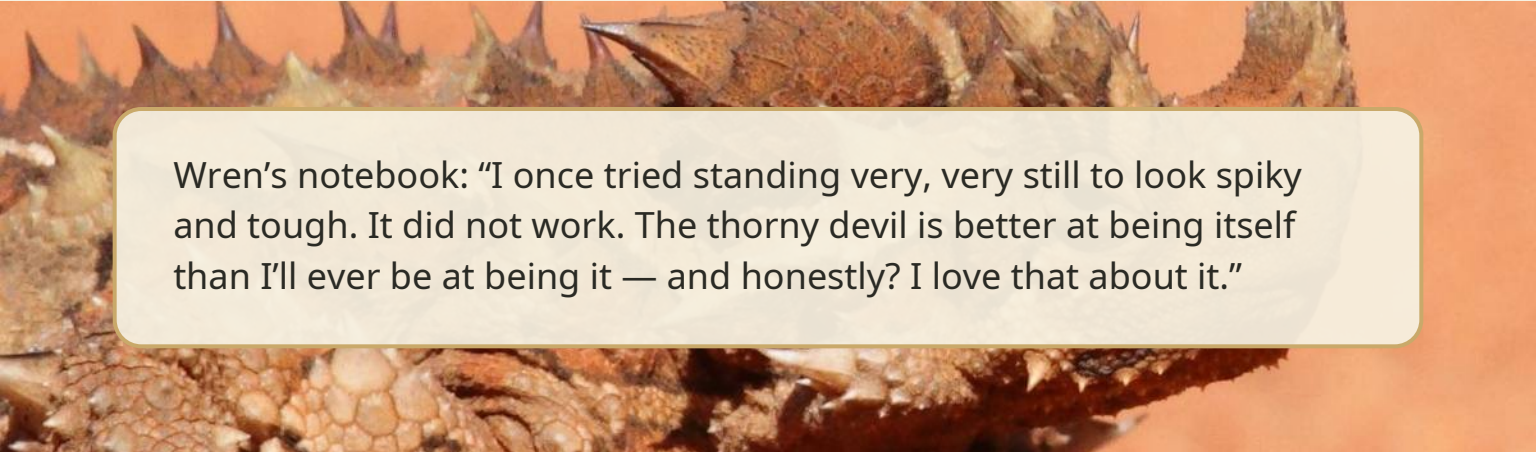
See that knob on its neck? That's a FAKE HEAD, mate. When danger shows up, it tucks its real head down and offers the fake one instead. Cheeky!

About Kepler-186f

- Kepler-186f sits about 500 light-years away, in the constellation Cygnus.
- That's... really, really far, mate.
- It orbits a red dwarf star and is roughly the size of Earth — the first Earth-size planet ever found in another star's habitable zone!
- One year there lasts about 130 days, and it gets roughly one-third the sunlight Earth gets. Cosy — but dim.
- Nobody knows if it has air, water or land. No one has EVER seen its surface.

WHAT I DREAMED UP

Sailback

- The Sailback — a gentle giant I dreamed up, riding the planet's strong winds on huge, glowing, see-through wings.
- Under a dim red sun, it can drift for days without a single flap. No worries at all.
- No one has discovered a Sailback. It lives only in my imagination — but Kepler-186f is real, and it's out there right now.

Wren's note: "Kepler-186f was the first Earth-size planet found where liquid water could exist. "Could" is my favourite word in science. It means: keep wondering."

One of only FIVE mammals on Earth that lay eggs. (The other four are echidnas — the platypus's spiky cousins!)

2

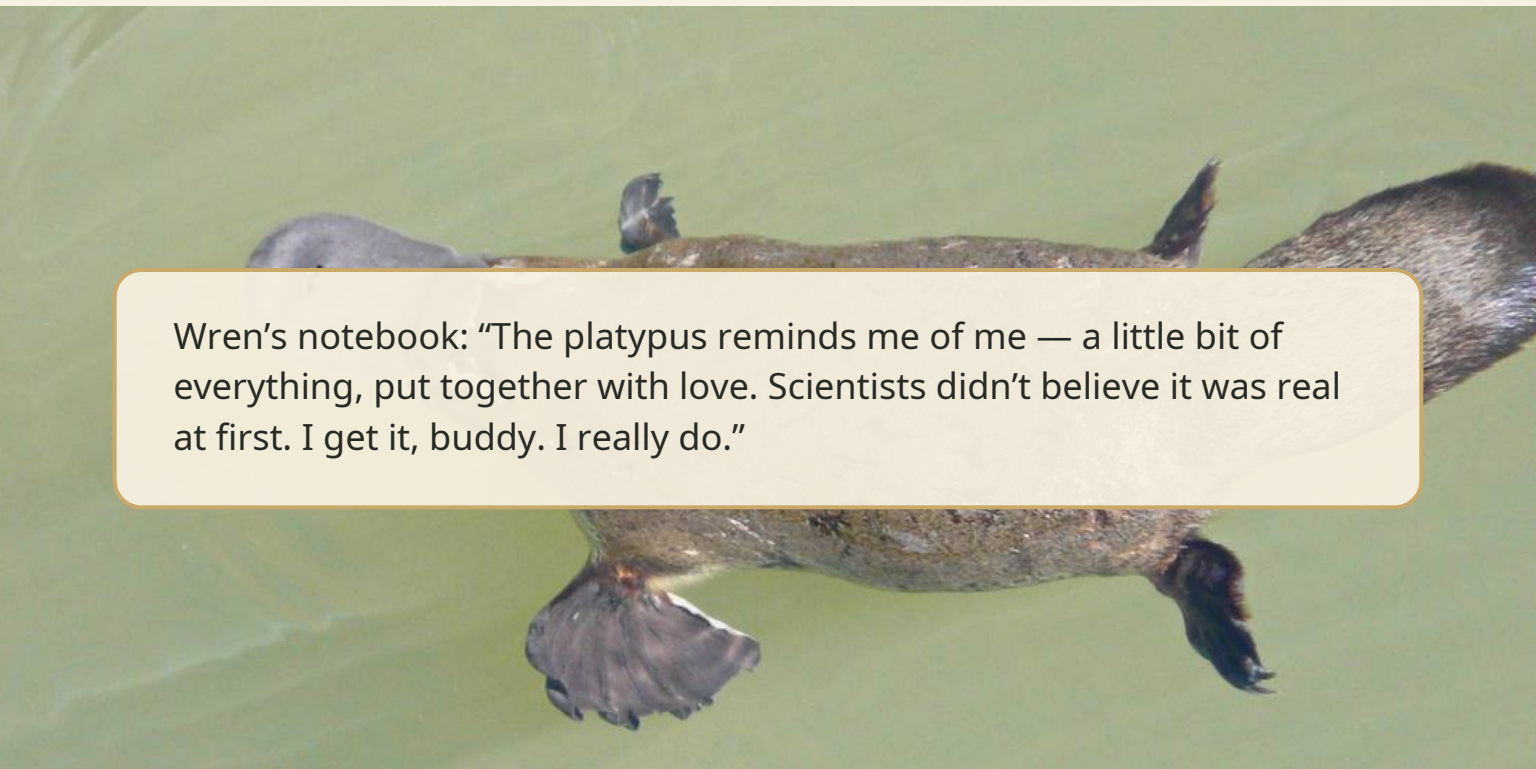
It hunts with its eyes, ears and nostrils SHUT — finding shrimp and worms by sensing the tiny electric buzz every living body gives off. Built-in superpower!

Boy platypuses carry venomous spurs on their back ankles. So: look with your eyes, not your hands, mate.

Duck bill, beaver tail, otter feet — and it lays eggs! When scientists first saw one, they were sure someone had stitched different animals together.

About Proxima Centauri b

- Proxima Centauri b is about 4.2 light-years away — our nearest neighbouring planet. Practically next door! (In space terms.)
- It orbits an active red dwarf, and a whole year there lasts just 11.2 days. Birthdays every week and a half!
- It might always show the same face to its star — one side stuck in endless day, the other in endless night.
- Its star fires off violent flares. Whether the planet held onto its air is one of the biggest open questions in astronomy.

Duskdrifter

- The Duskdrifter — a soft, glowing drifter I imagined living along the twilight border, where the light stays gentle.
- It glows faintly as it drifts, like a lantern moving through fog. Beautiful, eh?
- No one has discovered a Duskdrifter. It lives only in my imagination — but the planet is real.

Wren's note: "Four light-years sounds close, but it's about 25 trillion miles. Still — it's our next-door neighbour. I like imagining who might live next door."

2

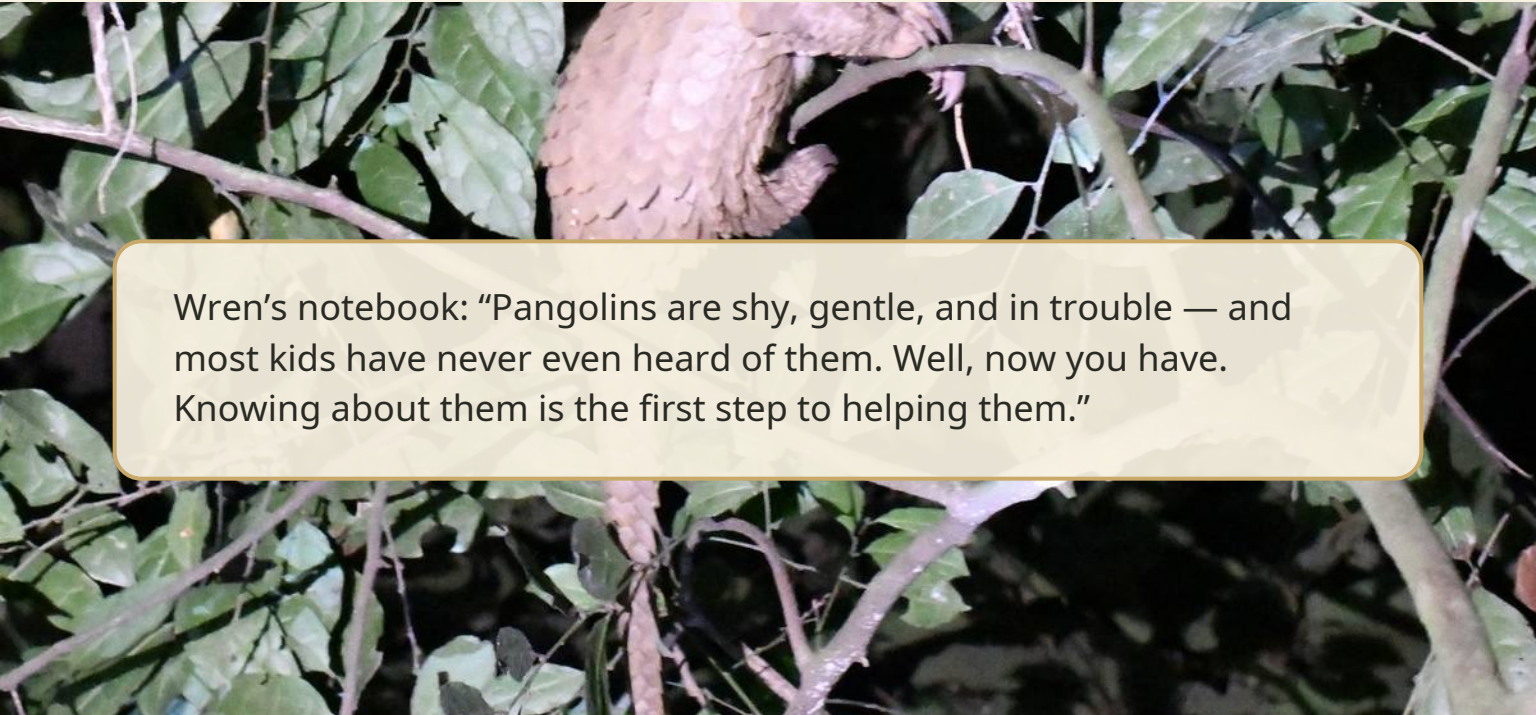
No teeth at all. Instead, a sticky tongue up to 40 cm long — longer than a school ruler — slurps up tens of thousands of ants and termites every single night.

About TRAPPIST-1e

- TRAPPIST-1e sits about 40.7 light-years away — rocky, close to Earth in size, and one of SEVEN planets around one tiny star!
- It's in its star's habitable zone, and a year there lasts only about 6.1 days. You'd need a LOT of birthday cake.
- So far, scientists have not found an atmosphere or oceans there. If water exists... we haven't seen it yet.

WHAT I DREAMED UP

Ribbonfin

- The Ribbonfin — I imagined an ocean that might be there, and swimming in it, a creature with long, glowing ribbon fins.
- The ocean is my imagination. The planet is real. No one has discovered a Ribbonfin.

Wren's note: "Seven planets around one small star — TRAPPIST-1 feels like a solar system squeezed into a snow globe. I gave planet 'e' an ocean because... well. Somebody had to."
